When we reviewed the M9 we said that sticking to a lower resolution at 5-inches kind of makes sense, especially if it retained battery life. But as the display and battery performance on the M9 was worse than the M8, it felt like a step backwards. The M9 avoids this fate to some extent because it does not try to replicate the excellent M8 results. However, when put next to the M9 we have the M9 office display easily looks better.
